Content	<p>Enzymology course is divided into 14 topics given in two parts, 8 topics in the form of theories related to an enzyme that is given using Teacher Learning Center method. The following part of 6 topics, the students obtain many knowledge about various application of enzymes in the fields of agriculture, animal husbandary, food, health, pharmaceuticals and environmental science and deliver the presentations based on recent journal or review related to enzymes. Enzymology course discusses the molecular structure of the enzyme in conjunction with the enzyme functions as biocatalisator of various metabolic reactions; Classification and nomenclature of enzymes; biosynthesis and turnover of enzymes; isoenzymes; regulation of enzyme activity; isolation, purification and enzyme assay; enzyme kinetics; the role and application of enzymes in various fields of life sciences.</p>
